Supporting material

Gathering materials

- Always support your ideas with independent/external sources
- Personal experience/story makes the topic more relevant and closer to the audience
- Internet is the most relevant and easiest to use
 - Search engines (e.g. Google scholar)
 - o Newspaper archives

Tips for doing research

- Start early!
- Make a preliminary bibliography
- Take efficient notes
 - Record notes on index cards
 - Write the note, source of the note and a subject heading
 - Use a separate card for each note
 - Distinguish between quotes, paraphrases
 - Take plenty of notes
- Read
 - o Progressively general to specific, introductory to advanced
 - Selectively based o date, relevance
 - Efficiently not from beginning to end! Use contents, abstracts, reading first 1-2 sentences of a paragraph, ...
- Think about your material, adapt to what you learn while doing the research

INFERENCE: mental leap from supporting material to the claim

- Examples
 - o Individual vs. aggregate
 - Factual vs. hypothetical
 - Are they representative, vivid, well-presented?
- Testimonies
 - Is the source recent, unbiased and has expertise?
 - Expert vs. peer testimony
 - Quote short and clear testimonies, paraphrase others
- Statistics
 - Are they reliable and representative?
 - Explain them sufficiently
