Course description

This course enables students to acquire core skills and understanding in research methodologies used in three core areas in the department of English and American studies: linguistics, literature and L2 teaching. We will cover the basics of formulating research questions, designing experiments for answering them, ways of processing and analyzing data, and ways of presenting them primarily in the written form. Students will be encouraged to work on a term project in which they collect their own data and analyze them, which may or may not lead to a diploma thesis.
